<u>SIDEWALKS</u> – Snow/ice is to be removed from the sidewalks within 24 hours after a winter storm ceases. Properties at street intersections: **please** clear the snow that piles up at the sidewalk corners. This will help school children, the postal service and other pedestrians safely cross the street. We ask those who do not have sidewalks to follow this as well.

<u>PLOWING STREETS</u> – Please keep trees & shrubs cut back from the roadway, or the roadway may not be plowed. The snow plows will be plowing snow from "curb to curb" to remove as much snow from the streets as possible. This process takes time so please have patience and bear with us as we work to clear the streets as quickly as we can. When removing snow from your sidewalks, do not shovel the snow into the streets. **In heavy snow storms, plows will be clearing driving lanes as quickly as possible and then will go back to work

on clearing the sides/shoulders of the roads from curb to curb. Unfortunately, this sometimes pushes snow back on to your sidewalks which you may already have shoveled. If this occurs, we apologize for the inconvenience and added work that it may cause you, but it is essential to make our streets safe.

In the event of a **Snow Emergency**, announcements will be made on **WGAL-TV 8**, **FOX 43**, **ABC 27 WHTM**, **CBS 21**, **WARM 103.3**, **96.1 WSOX**, **FROGGY 107.7**, **ROCKY 98.5** and the local newspapers.

<u>NO PARKING</u> will be allowed on the "snow emergency routes" when an emergency is declared. Vehicles that are not moved will be towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

Snow Emergency Routes:

The following streets shall be declared snow emergency routes: (Streets are posted)

- Main St.
- South side of W. Maple St. from Borough Line to N. Walnut St.
- South side of E. Maple St. from N. Walnut St. to N. Park St.
- N. Walnut St. from Main St. to Maple St.
- S. Walnut (WEST SIDE ONLY) from Main St. to E. Gay St.
- E. Gay St. (SOUTH SIDE ONLY) from S. Walnut St. to S. Pleasant Ave.
- N. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to E. Broad St.
- E. Broad St. from N. Pleasant Ave. to N. Lombard St.
- N. Lombard St. from E. Broad St. to Borough Line
- S. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to Borough Line
- N. Park St. from Main St. to E. Maple St.



Temporary parking is available at the following locations when a snow emergency is in effect: Fire Company parking lot, High School and Elementary School parking lots and Bethlehem United Methodist Church, Christ Lutheran Church and St. Paul's United Church of Christ parking lots.

LEAF COLLECTION IN THE BOROUGH



Leaf collection will run from <u>October 17th through</u> December 9th, weather permitting.

Please remember to rake them as close to the edge of the curb as possible away from cars, fences, posts or poles. **Tree limbs, sticks, shrub or hedge trimmings, grass, stones,dog waste, or any other foreign objects are not to be deposited in the leaves; otherwise the leaves will not be collected.** Thank you for your cooperation.



If you see a street light that is out or not working properly, please contact the Borough at 244-6626. We are not always around at night to see the problems first-hand, so any help would be greatly appreciated.



When walking your pets, **PLEASE** be responsible and clean up after them.





A MESSAGE FROM THE TAX COLLECTOR......

A Per Capita Tax of \$10.00 is levied upon each resident of the Borough who

is eighteen (18) years of age or older and has lived in the Borough during any part of the fiscal year.

SWIFT911 is a new way for the Borough to contact all of our water subscribers and our

residents at any given time in case of an emergency such as water main breaks in your area, snow emergencies, hydrant flushing, etc.

If you are not receiving notifications, all you need to do is provide your contact information. Signing up on SWIFT911 is free, quick, and very helpful for you and the Borough. TREES & SHRUBS OVERHANGING THE STREETS & SIDEWALKS......

Trees that are overhanging streets & sidewalks should be trimmed up about 15 feet. Bushes & shrubs growing out into the streets & sidewalks should be trimmed away from the right-of-way, no less than 6 feet.



SPRING STREET SWEEPING

Please remember to keep your sidewalks clear for street sweeping this year. If your walks are not cleared, a "Quality of Life" violation can and will be issued.

DON'T FORGET

Disconnect your garden hose from the outside faucet when the temperature drops.





What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is the precipitation that flows across the ground after it rains or when snow and ice melt.

Stormwater can become an issue as it picks up debris, dirt, and chemicals when it flows. It can also cause flooding that erodes stream banks. This polluted stormwater is collected in our storm sewer systems which are made up of pipes and roadside ditches. All of the stormwater collected eventually makes it to our streams, lakes, and wetlands. Since stormwater is not treated, the pollutants that have been collected make it back into our waters!

What can we do to help?

- Properly dispose of hazardous waste, and never put them down the storm sewer drain.
- Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly.
- Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly as to not create excess runoff.
- Install residential stormwater systems such as rain gardens or rain barrels that keep the stormwater on site and not into the storm sewer system.

RECYCLABLES & HOW TO PREPARE THEM

CARDBOARD **Corrugated Cardboard and Shipping Boxes Only**

Remove all packaging inside the box (such as peanuts, bubble wrap, etc.). Flatten ALL boxes





PAPER **Newspapers Only**

Cover loose papers with heavier items in the container to prevent them from

blowing away.

PLASTIC BOTTLES

Plastic Water, Juice & Soda Bottles Plastic Containers & Bottles #1, #2 & #5 – This may include items such as shampoo bottles, Liquid detergent



containers, condiment bottles, etc. Please check the container to find the designated number. (The neck of the bottle should be smaller than the base.)

Remove caps or lids.

Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue. Labels & neck rings do not need to be removed from containers.



METAL & ALUMINUM Aluminum Cans, Steel Cans & Food **Containers**

CARTONS



Cartons are defined as a type of packaging that food & beverage products come in that you purchase at the store. There are 2 types of cartons:

Shelf-Stable Cartons - include juice, milk, soy milk, soup & broth, and wine cartons. These are cartons that do not need to be kept cold.

Refrigerated Cartons - include milk, juice, cream and egg substitute cartons. These items must be kept cold.

Be sure to remove straws.

Make sure carton is empty and rinsed out.

Cartons may be placed in your bin along with all other recyclables.

GLASS Food & Beverage Glass only Clear brown, blue & green glass food & beverage containers



Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue. Remove any plastic caps or tops. Labels do no need to be removed.

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

The following items are NOT recyclable:

Food-Soiled Materials Broken Glass **Drinking Glasses** Scrap Metal Needles & Medical Waste Windows, Mirrors & Ceramics Aluminum Foil Plastic Tableware (Knives, Forks, etc.) Plastic Bags (including grocery bags) Solvents, Oil and/or Chemical Containers Waxy Cardboard **Used Paper Towels or Tissues** Hoses Shredded Paper Light Bulbs Soaked and/or Wet Papers or Cardboard **Plastic Food Wrappers Christmas Lights Propane Tanks**

DALLASTOWN EMA NEWS

As we approach the fall/winter seasonHow prepared are you? Do you have your go-bag packed? If you need a copy of the list for your bag they are available at the Borough office. During extreme cold weather or winter storms, staying warm and safe can be a challenge. Winter storms can bring power failures, loss of communication services, and icy roads. To keep yourself and your loved ones safe including your pets, you should know how to prepare your home and car before a winter storm hits.

Create an emergency car kit: cell phone, charger, extra batteries, hats, coats, mittens, blankets, windshield scraper, battery powered radio with extra batteries, flashlight with extra batteries, water, snack food, first aid kit, necessary medication, tow chains/tow rope, tire chains, canned compressed air with sealant for emergency tire repair, cat litter or sand, road salt., booster cables or jumper cables, hazard or other reflectors, emergency flares or emergency distress flags, and road map.

Also, listen to weather forecasts, check supplies and bring your pets indoors if you can't provide adequate shelter to keep them warm; make sure they have access to unfrozen water. Have your car ready, have maintenance service on your vehicle as often as the manufacturer recommends.

Also make sure your generators are serviced. All family members have an I.C.E. kit, in case of an emergency contact list, and know your shelter locations. It is also important that all family members know how to dial 911 when there is a life threatening emergency. Checking on your neighbors and the elderly is always a good idea too. Check out the homeland security website for residential as well as our business community @ www.ready.gov.com to provide you with a preparedness toolkit. If you are interested in preparedness training you can contact he Borough office at 717-244-6626. Training is free. Appointments can be made for me to come to your school, business, daycare, or residence. All our work is volunteer and rewarding.

PREPARE! DON'T LET A WINTER STORM TAKE YOU BY SURPRISE

AT HOME AND WORK:

- Flashlight and extra batteries. •
- Battery- powered NOAA Weather Radio and portable radio to receive emergency information. ٠
- Extra food and water such as dried fruit, nuts, granola bars and other food requiring no cooking or ٠ refrigeration.
- Extra prescription medicine. •
- Baby items if needed such as diapers and formula. •
- First-aid supplies. •

Warm Clothes

- Heating fuel: refuel before you are empty. •
- Emergency heat source: fireplace, wood stove or space heater properly ventilated to prevent a fire. •
- Fire extinguisher, smoke alarm; test smoke alarms monthly to ensure they work properly. •
- Extra pet food if needed and warm shelter for pets. •
- Never run a generator in an enclosed space. •
- Make sure your carbon monoxide detector is working correctly and that the outside vent is clear of ٠ leaves and debris. During or after the storm, make sure it is cleared of snow.

WILL YOU NEED HELP WITH RAKING AND SHOVELING?

York County older adults age 60+, who are interested in getting help with fall cleanup, raking, snow shoveling, programming electronic devices, or with other household chores are encouraged

to arrange for help from a Rent-A-Kid. The Rent-A-Kid program is sponsored by the York County Area Agency on Aging. This is an "intergenerational program" that connects together York County older adults who need help, and nearby middle and high school students in grades 7-12, who want to help. For over 30 years, "Kids" have been helping and learning from older adults through the Rent-A-Kid program. The **goal** of the Rent-A-Kid program is not only to get an important job done, but also to foster friendships between older adults and youth. Lifelong, rewarding relationships have blossomed between kids and older adults!

Older adults in need of assistance can call the Rent-A-Kid coordinator, Hope Eberly, at **717-771-9103**, who will provide names and phone numbers for youth nearby who may be interested. It is the responsibility of the older adult to contact the youth and discuss the job to be done, when it is to be done, the rate of pay for the job, and any other arrangements that need to be made. The older adult needs to be agreeable to a reimbursement of a minimum of \$5/hour, or a negotiated rate based on the job.

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Peppermint Snowball Cookies

Prep Time15 minutes Cook Time7 minutes Chill 30 minutes Total Time 52 minutes Servings 48 Calories 82 kcal



Ingredients

- 1 cup unsalted butter softened
- 2/3 cup powdered sugar sifted
- 2 1/4 cup all-purpose flour spooned and leveled
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp peppermint extract
- red or pink food coloring
- 3/4 cup Andes peppermint baking chips
- additional powdered sugar for coating

Instructions


- 1. Beat butter and powdered sugar together until light and fluffy, about 2 mins.
- 2. Mix in flour, salt, and extract just until combined.
- 3. Add food color a few drops at a time until desired color is achieved. Stir in peppermint baking chips.
- 4. Refrigerate dough, covered, for at least 30 minutes.
- 5. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper or silicone baking mat.
- 6. Scoop out one tablespoon of dough at a time and form into a ball. Place on prepared sheet.
- 7. Bake for 7 to 8 minutes. You do not want the cookies to get more than very lightly browned on the bottom. Let cool for 5 minutes on the baking sheet.
- 8. Line another large baking sheet with parchment paper and dust liberally with powdered sugar.
- 9. Place slightly cooled cookies on this baking sheet and dust with additional powdered sugar. Let cool completely.
- 10. Fill a small bowl halfway with powdered sugar. Drop cookies one at a time into the bowl and turn until coated in powdered sugar.

Store in an airtight container for up to 4 days.

- 11×17 inch sheet pan
- silicone baking mat or parchment paper
- hand mixer or stand mixer







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
