BOROUGH NEWS

FLUSHING: The Dallastown-Yoe Water Authority will begin flushing hydrants on April 19th. Please be aware that some discoloration of the water may occur, and you may be without water for short periods of time during the flushing procedure. Make sure your water is not discolored before doing laundry.

STREET SWEEPING: Borough Maintenance will be

starting the street sweeping on Monday, April

5th and should be finishing by Wednesday,

April 14th depending on the weather. Please have your sidewalks cleaned before street sweeping begins. Thank you!

POTHOLES:

With the harsh winter that we've had, it's



almost a guarantee that there will be potholes throughout the Borough. If you happen to discover any that Borough Maintenance has not, please contact the Borough Office at 244-6626. Thanks so much for your help!

STREET LIGHTS:



If you happen to see a street light that is out or not functioning properly, please contact the Borough Office. We are not always

around at night to see the problems firsthand, so any help would be greatly appreciated.

TAX COLLECTOR:

Linda Shaub, the Dallastown Borough Tax Collector will be at the Borough Office on Wednesday, April 14th from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm and Thursday,



April 15th from noon to 2:00 pm. She will be located in the Council Room to the rear of the building. Please enter thru the double glass doors on the side of the building.

PET OWNERS: When walking your pets, please be responsible and clean up after them. Thank you!



RENTAL UNITS: All residential rental units must be registered and inspected by the Borough.



VEHICLES: All vehicles parked outside of an enclosed structure (garage) shall be current with both inspection & registration, shall not have flat tires or be dismantled and must be operable.

POOLS: All Pools (temporary or permanent) capable of



holding 24 inches of water or more must meet the building code regulations of Dallastown Borough. Please fill out the building permit application prior to setting up your pool.

TREES & SHRUBS OVERHANGING THE STREETS & SIDEWALKS:

Trees that are overhanging streets & sidewalks should be trimmed up about 15 feet. Bushes & shrubs growing out



into the streets & sidewalks should be trimmed away from the right-of-way.

GRASS GROWING IN THE CURBS & SIDEWALKS:

The sidewalks adjacent to your property are vours to maintain. Grass & weeds are to be removed from curbing & sidewalks,

including where the curb joins the street, and around utility poles & traffic signs.

Help Dallastown Borough keep its small-town charm by removing the weeds from your sidewalks. Kindly refrain from discharging grass clippings into the streets or on the sidewalks.

GRASS GROWING IN EXCESS OF 8 INCHES ON YOUR PROPERTY:

Grass & other vegetation shall be maintained to a height of no more than 8 inches on your property. Poison ivy and other nuisance "weeds" shall be removed as well.



If your property falls into a non-compliance state, a violation letter will be sent by certified mail to the owner or tenants who reside on the property. If the nuisances still exist, a non-traffic citation will be issued each day the property is in non-compliance.

YARD SALE PERMIT: A permit is required, per



Dallastown Borough Ordinance. You may stop into the Borough office at 175 E. Broad St. to purchase a permit, the cost is \$10.00.

The following items **ARE** recyclable.

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

The following items are **NOT** recyclable.

Penn Waste would like to issue a reminder to residents in south central Pennsylvania that pool chemicals should NOT be disposed of in your curbside trash and recycling bins. Pool chemicals are considered hazardous waste and need to be disposed of properly.

The Solution

Here are several options for getting rid of pool chemicals:


- Take them to a facility that handles hazardous waste. Make sure you check with your local solid waste authority to see if they accept pool chemicals prior to arriving.
- York County Solid Waste Authority
- Check with the pool store you originally bought them from to see if they have a disposal method.
- Donate them to a community pool or your neighbors who have pools.
- Shock your pool by dumping the left over pool chemicals in before you close it for the season.

We appreciate your help in keeping our team members safe!

What is Stormwater Runoff, and Why is it Important?

Stormwater runoff is rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground and into the Borough's stormwater system or directly into creeks and streams.

As this runoff flows, it can pick up and transport harmful pollutants such as oils and greases, heavy metals, pesticides, fertilizers, trash and debris, sediment, and animal wastes.



Our storm drains do not connect to water treatment facilities, but rather drain untreated into local waterways.


Pollutants are carried along with stormwater runoff into our creeks, streams, and the Chesapeake Bay.


As a result, contaminated stormwater runoff is a major source of pollution to our local waterways. Excessive contamination of runoff causes sedimentation of our streams, water quality degradation, and unhealthy water conditions for humans and wildlife.

Dallastown Borough's Stormwater System and Stormwater Management Program:

Dallastown Borough has a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). This means that stormwater and sanitary sewage are completely separated. The Borough's stormwater conveyance system is made up of storm drains, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels, and streams that are connected by a network of underground pipes.

Since our stormwater system drains to surface waters, Dallastown Borough is required to develop a stormwater management program. There are six key elements of the stormwater management program; the key elements are addressed through the development and implementation of best management practices (BMPs) and will lead to water quality improvements through the reduction of pollutants to the maximum extent practicable.





Avoiding Stormwater Pollution -Garden Activities



Landscape design – Use native plants, which are already adjusted to regional climactic conditions, require less irrigation and fertilizer, and are more disease resistant. Consider

ground cover in place of some lawn or turf areas, as they require less maintenance and water than lawns.

Fertilizer Use - The reduction or

elimination of fertilizer use is encouraged; if you must use fertilizers apply them sparingly and consider



non-toxic options such as composted organic material. Also, only apply fertilizer in the fall, when it will promote root growth and a healthier lawn and garden. Remember that fertilizer can get washed away when it rains and enter the stormwater system, adding excessive and harmful nutrients into local creeks and streams



Use Mulch – Using mulches in your landscaping and gardening helps to retain water, reduce weed growth, prevent

erosion and runoff, and improve the soil for plant growth.

Irrigate Efficiently water that is applied to

gardens is not absorbed



Much of the lawns and by the

vegetation. When water is applied too quickly, it is lost as runoff along with the top layers of soil. To prevent this, it is important to use low-volume watering approaches such as drip-type systems. In addition, watering should only occur in the early morning or evening, when temperatures are lower and less water evaporates.

Pesticide Use - Like fertilizers, pesticides should be used on lawns and gardens only when absolutely necessary. Pesticide use can be avoided entirely by selecting hearty plants that are native to the area and by keeping them healthy. It is also important to identify any potential pests to determine if they are truly harmful to the plant. If it is necessary to use chemical pesticides, the least toxic pesticide that targets the specific pest in question should be chosen and instructions should be followed carefully.



Pet Waste Management - When walking your pet, please remember to pick up their waste and dispose of it properly. Bagging the waste and throwing it away is the best disposal method.

Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and excess nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local water bodies.

Trash Management - When trash is not properly

disposed of, litter enters the stormwater system. This eventually enters our waterways, increasing the risk of flooding by clogging up storm drains and pipes and posing



a threat to wildlife and human health. Practice waste reduction to limit the amount of trash you generate by reusing materials, buying products with less packaging, and throwing less away. You can also participate in recycling programs to reduce the quantity of waste being disposed of in landfills and substitute used materials for virgin materials, thereby reducing the demand for natural resources.



Household Hazardous Waste - That

cabinet of cleaners and chemicals under the sink may contain hazardous substances. Hazardous materials exist in our homes in many seemingly

innocent forms such as paints and stains, cleansers and polishes, motor oil and antifreeze, and pesticides and herbicides, to name only a few. Typically, these products have the words "Danger", "Warning" or "Caution" on the label. These words are signals that you should be careful when using and disposing of these products.

Dangerous reactions are possible when hazardous materials are combined, so never mix used motor oil, antifreeze, gasoline, paint, paint thinner, pesticides, solvents or other potentially hazardous liquids together. We urge everyone to protect the environment and never pour these items onto the ground or down a storm sewer. Just think, one quart of oil can contaminate 250,000 gallons of water! Hazardous material should also be segregated from your daily solid waste stream and stored safely pending proper disposal. Please check on you neighbors who may be elderly, disabled or just live alone. They may need our help not only in the winter, but throughout the year.

For everyone, don't forget your Families "Go Bag" or your Pets "Go Bag". There is community residential support available to help with home evacuation plans, and as well as getting your "Go Bags" prepared. You can check out www. Ready.gov for additional preparedness support.

THINKING SPRING/SUMMER

As the summer approaches, bringing storms and possible power outages with it, it is a good idea to have a **"Go Bag"** on hand if needed. You never know when a storm might hit,



causing you to seek shelter at one of our shelter locations, such as the Borough Building or Fire Hall.

Here's a list of items for your "Go Bag":

- ✤ Light Sticks
- ✤ Radio (Battery or Solar)

- ✤ Poncho
- ✤ Emergency Blanket
- ✤ Fire Starter
- ★ 50' Para Cord or Para Cord Survival Bracelet
- ✤ Dust Mask

- Emergency Cash (Small Denominations)
- ★ Sturdy Shoes/Change of Clothes/Warm Hat
- ✤ Local Map
- ✤ Water & Food (MREs)
- ✤ First Aid Kit
- ✤ Permanent Marker/Paper/Write in Rain Tape
- ✤ Photos of Family Members & Pets (for ID)
- ✤ List of Emergency Contact Numbers

- Prescription Medications

Build a Kit for Your Pet

Just as you do with your family's emergency supply kit, think first about the basics for survival, such as food and water. Have two kits, one larger kit if you are sheltering in place and one lightweight version for if you need to evacuate. Review your kits regularly to ensure that their contents, especially foods and medicines, are fresh.



Here's a list of items for your "Pet Go Bag":

- ★ Keep several day's supply of food in an airtight, waterproof container.
- * Store a water bowl and several days of water.
- Keep an extra supply of the medicine your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container.
- Talk to your veterinarian about what is most appropriate for your pet's emergency medical needs.
- Include a backup leash, collar and ID tag. Have copies of your pet's registration information and other relevant documents in a waterproof container and available electronically.
- Traveling bag, crate or sturdy carrier, ideally one for each pet.
- Pet conditioner and other items, in case your pet needs some cleaning up.
- Include pet litter and litter box (if appropriate), newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs.
- If you become separated from your pet during an emergency, a picture of you and your pet together will help document ownership and allow others to assist you in identifying your pet.
- Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit.
 Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.

Don't forget to also make a "Go Bag" for your pets!

NEW SOUTHERN AREA FIRE AND EMERGENCY RESCUE ORGANIZED New

Organization Formed to Improve Community Public Safety Services Dallastown, PA – Representatives from two volunteer fire-rescue companies that serve Dallastown and Yoe Boroughs and parts of York and Windsor Townships in York County jointly announced today that they are starting a new chapter in their history. The new Southern Area Fire and Emergency Rescue, also known as SAFER York, was formed to improve public safety services and create a stronger volunteer fire-rescue service to serve these municipalities and surrounding communities. "When this group of dedicated public servants looked at all the options available to improve the volunteer fire-rescue service from the community's perspective, it was decided that a merger of Rescue Fire Company No. 1 Dallastown and Yoe Fire Company was the best path forward for the residents, businesses, and visitors to the area," Ron Miller, Chairman of the merger steering committee said. Barry Myers, a life member and President of the Yoe Fire Company, agreed that there were several reasons to complete the merger. "We see how many volunteer Fire-Rescue and EMS organizations are struggling today across Pennsylvania and the country trying to maintain manpower, be fiscally responsible and provide top-notch service. Instead of waiting until both organizations were struggling, the merger allows us to begin the next chapter in the history of these two fire companies stronger than ever before," he stated. Matt Shields, Fire Chief of Rescue Fire Company No. 1 agreed, "Being proactive will help us sustain the volunteer fire-rescue service for many more years." "Both Rescue Fire Company No. 1 and Yoe Fire Company have proud traditions and history. It is important to remember where we came from, acknowledge where we are today, and recognize where we need to get to in the future," said Tyler Boyce, President of Rescue Fire Company No. 1. "By adopting the day-to-day name of SAFER York, it connects the newly merged firerescue company directly to our communities" stated Yoe Fire Company Fire Chief Rick Searle. The new Southern Area Fire and Emergency Rescue will have approximately 75 active volunteer members operating out of two fire stations, one in Dallastown Borough and one in Yoe Borough, respond to over 1000 calls for service a year, and will protect the same coverage areas focusing on providing service to Dallastown Borough, Yoe Borough, parts of York and Windsor Townships, and surrounding communities.

BBQ SAFETY TIPS



- All barbeque grills must only be used outdoors — using grills indoors or in enclosed spaces is not only a fire hazard, but it exposes occupants to toxic gasses and potential asphyxiation.
- Always position the grill well away from combustible objects.
- Get your grill cleaned and serviced. Check all propane tanks and lines for leaks and damage.
- Never leave a lit grill unattended.
- Always use long handled grilling utensils and heat resistant oven mitts.
- Periodically remove grease build-up in catch trays to prevent it from igniting.
- Keep a garden hose nearby, connected and ready for use in case of a fire.



Are you a veteran or do you know any veterans? rabbittransit partners with 3P Ride, a non-profit organization, to offer various types of veteran transportation. One program offers transportation to local VA hospitals. This service is offered Monday through Friday and is no cost to veterans within Adams, Columbia, Cumberland, Dauphin, Montour and York Counties. For this program, veterans are encouraged to complete a basic application for shared ride service. Shared ride service aids in supplementing additional rider transportation options such as local medical, pharmacy, socialization or grocery trips and allows more veterans the opportunity to ride. Veterans should call (800) 632-9063 and press option 4.

Another service offered for veterans is a transportation program to help with employment opportunities. Veterans may obtain an 11-Ride Pass for the fixed route systems in these counties to attend job interviews. Once a job has been secured, a monthly pass is provided for four months. HAWAIIAN CHICKEN KABOBS




INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup soy sauce (or tamari)
- 1/4 cup canned pineapple juice
- 3 tablespoons honey (or brown sugar)
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil 1 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup cold water whisked
- 1 tablespoon corn starch
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, trimmed and cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces
- 3-4 bell peppers, cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces (colors of your choice)
- 1 large red onion, cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces
- 2 cups pineapple chunks
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil (or more sesame oil)
- oil or grill cooking spray for grill grates

INSTRUCTIONS

- Create marinade* in a small sauce pan over medium heat by whisking together soy sauce, pineapple juice, honey, sesame oil, garlic powder, ground ginger, salt and pepper. Bring to a simmer. Separately, whisk together cold water and corn starch until combined. Slowly stream cornstarch mixture into marinade. Whisk all together. Return to a simmer; allow to simmer, whisking occasionally, for 3-4 minutes until marinade thickens. Remove from heat. Set aside.
- 2. Place diced chicken in a large plastic zip-top bag or bowl. Add half of marinade; toss to coat chicken. Seal/cover chicken; refrigerate at least 1 hour up to 4 hours.
- 3. If using wooden skewers, soak in water for at least 30 minutes.
- 4. Preheat grill to medium heat.**
- 5. Alternately thread chicken, peppers, onion and pineapple onto skewers. Brush olive oil on vegetables.
- 6. Oil grill grate. Place kabobs on grill over medium heat. Grill, turning every 4-5 minutes and basting with remaining marinade until chicken is done; about 15-20 minutes.





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
