
CLYDESDALE PARADE



A unique part of this program is the involvement of participants in physical skill screenings to determine an individual's fall risk. Participants will be referred to appropriate healthcare professionals and community resources as deemed necessary.

It starts with a warmup, followed by strength and balance exercises, and ends with a cool-down stretch. There are three levels of exercise, which enables

participants to continue HSIM for as long as they like. HSIM strives to reduce the risk of falling by building body strength, increasing flexibility and improving balance.

For over 30 years, "Kids" have been helping and learning from older adults through the Rent-A-Kid program. The **goal** of the Rent-A-Kid program is not only to get an important job done, but also to foster friendships between older adults and youth. Lifelong, rewarding relationships have blossomed between kids and older adults!

Older adults in need of assistance can call the Rent-A-Kid coordinator, Hope Eberly, at **717-771-9103**, who will provide names and phone numbers for youth nearby who may be interested. It is the responsibility of the older adult to contact the youth and discuss the job to be done, when it is to be done, the rate of pay for the job, and any other arrangements that need to be made. The older adult needs to be agreeable to a reimbursement of a minimum of \$5/hour, or a negotiated rate based on the job.



WHAT IS LEAP YEAR?

Leap Year occurs every 4 years, adding an extra day in February......the 29th. Normally there are 365 days in our calendar year, but during leap year there are 366.



The reason we have a Leap Year has to do with the earth and the sun. It takes the earth 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes & 46 seconds to complete the orbit around the sun. This is called a Solar Year. The Solar Year is supposed to line up with our calendar year, but without adding a day every 4 years, that won't happen.

So, how do you know if it's going to be a Leap Year? The year must be able to be evenly divided by the number 4, such as 2020.

Here are some fun facts about Lear Year!

- The Egyptians were the first to start Leap Year. The Romans followed the Egyptians & picked the date February 29th.
- Babies born on Leap Day, February 29th, are called leaplings and usually celebrate their birthday on March 1st.
- The US Presidential Elections and Summer Olympics happen during Leap Year.
- Leap Years are the only years where January 1st & December 31st are on different days of the week.
- About 4 million people in the world have been born on February 29th.

WHAT IS EMA?

How many residents actually know what the Emergency Management Agency (EMA) does to keep everyone prepared for a natural disaster or emergency. The EMA Co-coordinator staff in your borough or municipality are trained continuously to help assist state level leaders & EMA personnel in handling all phases of the emergency management process, whether the emergency is a natural disaster or human caused!

The Commonwealth of PA Emergency operations Plan (EOP) follows the principles of the National Incident Management System specified by Homeland Security. Most disasters & emergencies are best managed in four phases: Prevention, Preparedness, Response, Recovery & Mitigation. (Stormready.gov)

Emergency Management in PA is based on a cooperative unified effort involving local, county, Regional Task Force, State, Federal, non-governmental, non-profit organizations & private sector working with individual citizens & communities to ensure protection from or adequate response to emergencies.

Every area of PA is at risk to human caused emergencies & Natural disasters. The state has considerable transportation infrastructures, air rail, marine & road traffic that is vulnerable to disastrous events.

Government & private agencies and organizations host sports, entertainment, cultural, political & business events that involve large numbers of participants.

So, ask yourself... am I prepared? Do you have your "Go Bag" list? What do you need for your emergency kit? Are you storm ready?

Butterscotch Apple Toffee Bars Recipe

Butterscotch Apple Toffee Bars, easy dessert recipe with graham crackers, toffee, apple chips, butterscotch, and walnuts.

Prep Time 15 minutes Cook Time 10 minutes Total Time 25 minutes Servings 8 - 10 servings Author Lisa Huff Ingredients

- 6-8 graham crackers
- ½ cup light brown sugar
- ½ cup unsalted butter
- 1 cup crushed dried apple chips
- 1 (11 oz.) bag butterscotch baking chips
- 1 cup chopped toasted walnuts

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
- 2. Line a 9x9-inch square baking pan with aluminum foil and lightly spray with nonstick spray.
- 3. Place crackers in single layer of pan to cover the whole bottom. Break the crackers as necessary to fit.
- 4. Spread brown sugar on the bottom of a small saucepan. Cut butter into about 8 slices and place on top of sugar. Place pan on top of medium-high heat and without stirring bring to a boil. Let boil about 2-4 minutes or until smooth and brown in color.
- 5. Pour toffee mixture (sugar and butter) over graham crackers and spread evenly with an offset spatula. Bake for about 5 minutes at 425 degrees F to set.

- 6. Sprinkle apple chips evenly over crackers then sprinkle butterscotch chips on top. Place back in oven for about 2-4 minutes or until chips start to melt. Remove from oven and spread chips to form a thin layer.
- 7. Sprinkle chopped nuts on top and gently press into butterscotch chips. Cool.
- 8. Place in refrigerator for about an hour or until butterscotch sets. Break or cut into pieces.






<u>SIDEWALKS</u> – Snow/ice is to be removed from the sidewalks within 24 hours after a winter storm ceases. Properties at street intersections: **please** clear the snow that piles up at the sidewalk corners. This will help school children, the postal service and other pedestrians safely cross the street. We ask those who do not have sidewalks to follow this as well.

<u>PLOWING STREETS</u> – The snow plows will be plowing snow from "curb to curb" to remove as much snow from the streets as possible. This process takes time so please have patience and bear with us as we work to clear the streets as quickly as we can. When removing snow from your sidewalks, do not shovel the snow into the streets.

**In heavy snow storms, plows will be clearing driving lanes as quickly as possible and then will go back to work on clearing the sides/shoulders of the roads from curb to curb. Unfortunately, this sometimes pushes snow back on to your sidewalks which you may already have shoveled. If this occurs, we apologize for the inconvenience and added work that it may cause you, but it is essential to make our streets safe.

In the event of a **Snow Emergency**, announcements will be made on **WGAL-TV 8**, **FOX 43**, **ABC 27 WHTM**, **CBS 21**, **WARM 103.3**, **96.1 WSOX**, **FROGGY 107.7**, **ROCKY 98.5** and the local newspapers.

NO PARKING will be allowed on the "snow emergency routes" when an emergency is declared. Vehicles that are not moved will be towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

Snow Emergency Routes:

The following streets shall be declared snow emergency routes: (Streets are posted)

- Main St.
- South side of W. Maple St. from Borough Line to N. Walnut St.
- South side of E. Maple St. from N. Walnut St. to N. Park St.
- N. Walnut St. from Main St. to Maple St.
- S. Walnut (WEST SIDE ONLY) from Main St. to E. Gay St.
- E. Gay St. (SOUTH SIDE ONLY) from S. Walnut St. to S. Pleasant Ave.
- N. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to E. Broad St.
- E. Broad St. from N. Pleasant Ave. to N. Lombard St.
- N. Lombard St. from E. Broad St. to Borough Line
- S. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to Borough Line
- N. Park St. from Main St. to E. Maple St.



Temporary parking is available at the following locations when a snow emergency is in effect: Fire Company parking lot, High School and Elementary School parking lots and Bethlehem United Methodist Church, Christ Lutheran Church and St. Paul's United Church of Christ parking lots.

LEAF COLLECTION IN THE BOROUGH

Leaf collection will run from October 21st through December 13th, weather permitting.

Tuesdays will be designated to the east side of the borough and Wednesdays will be designated to the west side. Please remember to rake them as close to the edge of the curb as possible away from cars, fences, posts or poles. Tree limbs, sticks, shrub or hedge trimmings, grass, stones or any other foreign objects are not to be deposited in the leaves; otherwise the leaves will not be collected. Thank you for your cooperation.

TREES & SHRUBS OVERHANGING THE STREETS & SIDEWALKS.....

Trees that are overhanging streets & sidewalks should be trimmed up about 15 feet. Bushes & shrubs growing out into the streets & sidewalks should be trimmed away from the right-of-way, no less than 6 feet.

Please remember to keep your sidewalks clear for street sweeping this year. If your walks are not cleared, a "Quality of Life" violation can and will be issued.

**Please remember that, from a public health standpoint, any standing water in rain barrels should be screened to keep mosquitoes from breeding. **



CARDBOARD Corrugated Cardboard and Shipping Boxes Only

Cover loose papers with heavier items in the container to prevent

them from blowing away.

PLASTIC BOTTLES

Plastic Water, Juice & Soda Bottles
Plastic Containers & Bottles #1, #2 &
#5 – This may include items such as
shampoo bottles, Liquid detergent
containers, condiment bottles, etc. Please check the
container to find the designated number. (The neck of
the bottle should be smaller than the base.)

Remove caps or lids.

Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue.

Labels & neck rings do not need to be removed from containers.



METAL & ALUMINUM Aluminum Cans, Steel Cans & Food Containers

Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue.

Remove any plastic caps or tops unless they are part of the can.

Labels do not need to be removed from cans.



CARTONS

Cartons are defined as a type of packaging that food & beverage products come in that you purchase at the store. There are 2 types of cartons:

Shelf-Stable Cartons – include juice, milk, soy milk, soup & broth, and wine cartons. These are cartons that do not need to be kept cold.

Refrigerated Cartons – include milk, juice, cream and egg substitute cartons. These items must be kept cold.

Be sure to remove straws.

Make sure carton is empty and rinsed out.
Cartons may be placed in your bin along with all other recyclables.

GLASS

Food & Beverage Glass only Clear brown, blue & green glass food & beverage containers



Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue.
Remove any plastic caps or tops.
Labels do no need to be removed.

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS
